Activity 2 - Geography

We are learning how to draw a sketch map.

A sketch map is a very simple map drawn from a 'bird's-eye view' which means it is drawn as if the person was a bird flying and they were looking down. It only shows the main features of an area.

Walk around your garden and see what is there.

Do you have a grass and a patio area? Do you have a shed and where is it? How many trees do you have and where are they?
